KUYUNBA 29 November 2014 by Connie Spencer; Photos by Rosalie Breen and Lye Lang

I should have written this as soon as we completed the outing! The memory is a bit fuzzy now but, I recall noting on the drive along Hatt Road to Kuyunba that the stands of Mulga (*Acacia aneura*) were healthy looking and that the Colony Wattles (*Acacia murrayana*) were loaded with seed pods.

Kuyunba is an Arrernte Aboriginal word meaning 'place of the uninitiated young men' and has strong ritual importance. Only adult men are to complete the 700 m loop walk and as we were five women we dutifully obeyed the sign which advised us only to go as far as the gallery of rock paintings.



As there hadn't been much rain since April, all the smaller plants were quite dry and shrivelled-up, but trees and larger shrubs were fine. We scrambled up the rocky ridge above the rock carvings and perched ourselves on a large flatish boulder and surveyed our surroundings, commenting on a Ghost Gum *(Corymbia aparrerinja)* and questioned the identity of other plants. As we were viewing these plants through binoculars, no conclusions were reached and it was not the right time of year to go scrambling through bushes and over boulders to get a closer view.




Eventually, as the sun rose and so too the temperature, we made our way back down to the rock paintings and returned to our vehicles via the same route. Along the way we noted the very different form the young Ironwoods (*Acacia estrophiolata*) have to the mature trees. The latter being a graceful tree, with a willow-like appearance and the juveniles had short, spiny leaves which gave them a prickly appearance. The Native Pine (*Callitris glaucophylla*) is the dominant tree species along the walk, especially along the base of the ridge.

Thank you Cec for organising and leading the walk and to the two Rosalies and Lye for your company – a pleasant way to spend an early Saturday morning.

History of the Alice Springs Field Naturalists by Bob Read

I have never been sure as to when the Alice Springs FNC first started. I had thought it was about 1974, but Elsa Corbett believed that it existed in the 1950's. My wife suggested trying Trove, the digitised Australian newspapers available online.

The Centralian Advocate has been digitised for the period 1947 to 1954, and searching found the article below published 27 September 1947.

FIELD NATURALISTS CLUB OF CENTRAL AUS.


A field naturalist's club excursion will be held in about the second week of October. There will be an expedition to the Lime stone Caves. Mr. Sneddon will lead the party and explain the various items of geological interest in that area. All those people interested in their country are cordially invited to attend. It will be a healthy outing and of great educational value. This paper will give further notice of the exact time and meeting place at a later date and hopes that the people will rally round.

A search of the Advocate files for Sneddon showed that there was an Inspector of Mines of that name, presumably the same person.

The location of the "Limestone Caves" is not clear. This could refer to what are now known as the Bat Caves, but these are unusual in that they are in conglomerate, not limestone. However caves in limestone in the region such as Bryn Cave are less suitable for a club excursion.

A field naturalists club has not existed continuously since that time. I believe it was re-started about 1974, and has been in recess at least once since then.

When The Advocate is digitised for the period after 1954 it will be easy to search for other early references to Field Naturalists in Alice Springs.
